### Introduction

#### **Portfolio Holder Statement**

As the Cabinet portfolio holder for Economy and Partnerships I am happy to say that the overview of the Area Action Partnerships falls under my remit.

Over the last 13 years AAPs have helped local community organisations to thrive through practical support and funding. 2022/23 has been no different. The 14 AAPs across County Durham have helped to fund over 230 projects through their Area Budgets allocating £2.6m to these good causes. This is making a massive difference when like the rest of us, local organisations are being adversely impacted by the continued long term impacts of the Covid pandemic and the cost of living crisis.

County Durham is a diverse place, and each AAP is led and directed by local people, councillors, and partners. This means they can adapt to local circumstances whether they be in Wingate or Westgate, Castleside or Coxhoe. This local engagement means AAPs are firmly rooted in, and valued by their communities.

Throughout County Durham AAP funding has supported a wide variety of projects including, youth work, mental health support, environmental projects, activities for older people, sports clubs, children's play, village halls and community centres, parish councils, community safety initiatives and employment schemes, just to name a few.

The AAPs also support myself and my fellow councillors in allocating our annual Neighbourhood Budget. The 126 County Councillors have allocated over £2.2m to over 820 local projects in County Durham over the past year, again supporting a wide range of local schemes.

As with any service, it is always good practice to consider if any improvements can be made. Having remained largely unchanged for the last 14 years, the need for an independent view as to how the service might be enhanced led to the recently completed community engagement review. While consultation is still ongoing on the proposals contained in the review, it comes as no surprise that the consultants found many strengths of the AAPs that we could build upon in the future.




We also ensured communication to the Spennymoor AAP forum and community lines stayed open through the use of social media and emails.

# Durham County Council Spennymoor Market Place

Spennymoor AAP allocated Towns and Village Funding towards the regeneration of Spennymoor Market Place. The funding contributed to the installation of a new bespoke lighting scheme which included the installation of four twin arm illuminated lighting columns. Four projectors have been installed in these bespoke columns.

These project images onto the paved area that has been created as an event space onto the gable of an adjourning building. The projectors are linked to timers initially programmed to operate between dusk and midnight.

The lighting columns have been constructed to a detailed specification which will ensure that they can accommodate any additional requirement to support the roll out of Town Centre Wi-Fi while also supporting the Councils Energy Reduction Policy.

The lighting columns have recently been used to mark the Kings Coronation and Armistice Day.



# St Andrews Parish Church Kitchen and toilet facility

The AAP has provided Area Budget funding (2021/22) and Neighbourhood Budget funding (2022/23) to support with the development of a new kitchen and disabled toilet facility at Saint Andrews Church. The extra Neighbourhood Budget funding was allocated due to the increased costs of materials for the project following the Covid pandemic.

Prior to the funding being allocated users of the Church needed to access an alternate building to access toilet facilities and this was proving problematic for people who were less mobile or had young children.

The development of the new kitchen facility has supported Saint Andrews Church by making the building more welcoming and people can move easily from services to refreshments and socialising.

The church has also developed a range of community activities in the church hall. This has included developing a range of children's activities that have has included the regular messy church group which offers a free breakfast and now has 30 members; along with one off activities such as the holiday club which operated during the summer holidays.



## Whitworth Park Academy Artificial 3G Pitch

The AAP have allocated Neighbourhood Budget (Town and Villages) Funding towards the construction costs of a full size floodlit artificial grass pitch at Whitworth Park Academy.

The pitch will be used by the community at evenings (up to 10pm), weekends and school holidays.

The flexible pitch configuration will allow up to 4 different users at the same time. The surface is suitable for a range of different sports and physical activities and can be used in all weathers.

The pricing policy will ensure everyone can access the pitch. The costs to hire will be comparable to existing Durham County Council managed facilities. All Spennymoor based football/sports and community clubs will have access for training and matches. Community-based youth clubs, associations and groups will have access to slots with subsidised funding to ensure the project is accessible to all residents.

# Cornforth Partnership Helping Hands

This project is to provide a support service to vulnerable individuals and families, affected by the current cost of living crisis.

The project will provide dedicated and qualified mentoring staff to work with individuals who are facing financial hardship which unfortunately could be potentially having a negative impact on their health and well-being, issues including housing, debt, benefits, employment, and poverty. Through the use of Outcome Star, the partnership will help individuals create client led action plans that indicate solutions to the barriers which individuals may be facing.

Alongside meeting people in their own homes, the team will also work in partnership with community venues and organisations to provide community led drop-in sessions. During these sessions there will be opportunities to access IT equipment.

The project will ensure individuals have direct access to other avenues of support including Domestic Abuse, Family Mentoring and Employment and Training. It will be accessible to all and will be linked to the Durham Works Provision



## Learning a New Way CIC **HAHF Project**

Holiday Activities with Healthy Food is a scheme that helps to support local community groups and organisations based in the Spennymoor area to deliver Holiday Activities with Healthy Food during the holidays.

This project rolled out by Learning a New Way CIC provided activities at Spennymoor Youth Centre based on a theme of "how to be happy!".

The sessions included an opportunity to engage with the practice of mindfulness and learning about strategies that support us to feel calmer and more confident. Children were provided with an opportunity to engage with team games and sporting activities in an informal and relaxed way. Healthy food was provided during each session.

During the final session children were given the opportunity to take part in an interactive 'Dino' session which was a unique and exciting experience for the children involved. They were given an overview of the Mesozoic period and were able to handle artefacts, learn about fossils, create artwork and build a dinosaur.

They were able to discuss key points such as, hunting methods, self defence and competing with other dinosaurs. The facilitator was also able to speak about Climate Change, it's impact on the dinosaurs and how this is relevant today.



# Learning Library Fuelling Van

The Learning Library offers specialist equipment to develop and support children and adults with additional needs in Spennymoor and the surrounding areas.

Through the provision of Spennymoor AAP funding to cover the running costs of the van this project will support one of the crucial elements of the Learning Library's core aims which is to provide valuable outreach support and equipment to their members.

By ensuring the organisation remains mobile during the current financial climate the members of the Learning Library will continue to have access to the specialist resources in their own homes, the visits by outreach workers supplying the equipment will also provide opportunities for social engagement with members reducing feelings of isolation and loneliness.
