[Dave Wafer] So those people that know Durham City will know that for some time we have been looking to regenerate the north road area and key to that is Durham Bus Station. In order to deliver this project we obviously need resources and today we welcome the fact that the Joint Transport Committee for the North East will be allocating £3.6million as part of the Transforming Cities Project. The remaining of the funding will be coming from the County Council to make up the full £10.4million for the project.

[Cllr Carl Marshall] I am absolutely delighted to welcome the news that the North East Combined Authority has awarded Durham County Council £3.6million pounds towards the re-development of the bus station in Durham City.

It's going to form a major part of our recovery as we look to get through the global pandemic as well.

So the announcement today means that actually we can push on with the project so we are looking to close the bus station from mid-February. We will be doing internal surveys and demolition to make sure that we know whats in there.

[Audio: Dave Wafer] We know that theres asbestos and other in the building itself. The building will be demolished and theres actually a stream that runs under the building that needs to be diverted and then the new bus station constructed. Overall we think this is going to take about 18 months.

[Audio: Dave Wafer] One of the key points of regenerating the bus station is, it is one of the entry points of the city so a lot of people arriving by train and by bus, this is the first impression of Durham City.

It's really important that when visitors come in and when we try to get people to come back after the pandemic to come shopping in our city centre that this is a key entry point.
